
The Pirate's Treasure

When Olivier Levasseur, a French pirate nicknamed La Buse (The Buzzard), was executed in 1730, legend has it that he threw a cryptogram into the crowd and cried: "Find my treasure, he who can!" A cryptogram believed to be connected to La Buse was published in 1934. Since then, treasure hunters have tried in vain to solve the riddle.

Three centuries later, the Swiss historian, investigator, and crossword writer Daniel Krieg decodes the cryptogram, then travels to Réunion to work with Mauritian archaeologist Dr Jayshree Mungur-Medhi. Connecting the cryptogram with a map from the 18th century, Daniel and Jayshree follow the clues to a small island in a remote lagoon off the coast of Mauritius. With a group of experts in metal detection, the two start digging - but will the team find the hidden treasure worth up to 2.4 billion euros today?

From the initial massacre and hostage crisis to the Israeli bombardment and largescale ground offensive against Hamas, the series documents the catastrophic consequences of the October 7th attack.

The Roman Fleet

The naval forces of Ancient Rome played a crucial role in the conquest of the Mediterranean and beyond - but how did the Roman fleet operate? To find answers, experimental archaeologists from the University of Trier reconstructed a full-scale historical replica of a Roman ship, using ancient craftsmanship and based on excavation findings.

As the ship is put to the test for the first time, researchers ask key questions: Which routes did the fleet navigate, and what dangers did it face? Which technical achievements and maritime infrastructure contributed to its success?

Sailing the same waters that once carried Roman soldiers, grain, and olives across the Roman Empire, this carefully reconstructed vessel offers fascinating insights into the maritime empire, naval trading routes, and the daily lives and tasks of Roman sailors.


guer Germania, but first, he had to secure the direct route north through the Alps. Despite its importance, little was known about this campaign until researchers uncovered an ancient battlefield - and the highest military camp of the Roman Empire - in the Swiss canton of Grisons.

A team of archaeologists worked with forensic and ballistics experts to reconstruct the campaign, revealing for the first time the route and the weapons used. A surprising discovery was the usage of lead sling-bullets to neutralise the enemy from a distance. The findings reveal how Roman soldiers overcame harsh mountain conditions in battle and in daily life. In a single summer, the army annexed vast regions of the Alps that joined the new Raetia province, remaining part of the Roman Empire



The Lost Women Spies In 2000, boxes containing top-secret files were found in a garden shed in Cornwall. They detailed the lives and code names of Britain's first female agents sent to the front line during the war. The British spymistress, Vera Atkins, had committed treason by keeping the papers, but she had a reason for doing so. During the war, Prime Minister Churchill desperately needed foreign agents, and though women were not allowed to fight on the front line, they could be sent behind enemy lines as spies. Vera was put in charge of the female spies, and when many of them went missing during the war, never to return, she was determined to find out their fate - in defiance of the British Vera's files were kept sealed until after she died, but the story of the female spies and the spymistress who led them, which has remained secret for over fifty years, can now be revealed. How did birds become the most diverse group of vertebrates, thriving in nearly every habitat on Earth? For centuries, this question baffled palaeontologists. The discovery of the Jurassic Archaeopteryx fossil in the 19th century provided an early clue, but it wasn't until the late 20th century, when feathered dinosaurs were found in China, that their evolutionary story became clear – birds are the sole surviving descendants of dinosaurs

Yet, one mystery remained – how did birds survive the asteroid that wiped out their giant cousins? In 2019, the discovery of a 67-million-year-old fossil in a Cambridge lab shed light on this mystery. Recent excavations, such as those in Las Hoyas in Spain, have added insights into the evolution of birds, revealing how they survived the catastrophe and rapidly diversified during the Cretaceous period.





Iconic Islands of the Indian Ocean

A three-part series that portrays the fragile nature and incredible beauty of the Maldives, Seychelles, Mauritius, and La Réunion. The team used innovative drone and underwater technology, frequently freediving underwater to unobtrusively capture incredible footage without heavy equipment or breathing noises. Viewers are introduced to rare animals that exhibit surprising behaviour never before captured on film, from a sperm whale nursery to sleepy sharks lurking in caves, from elegant manta rays to sooty terns.

The legendary diversity and beauty of the coral reefs, and the rare and protected double coconut, the Coco del Mar, are sadly under threat. Due to increasingly large amounts of refuse washing up on the beaches, the coral reefs are dying, and mangroves are disappearing. Can this delicate natural paradise be saved?



From silverback gorillas, the gentle giants who teach the youngsters in their troop critical life skills, to male lumpfish who protect over a hundred thousand eggs from predators. In king penguin societies, fathers share parenting duties equally, keeping chicks warm and fed – and as penguin parents can be same-sex couples, some chicks get double dads.



Underlords – Elegant Hunters of the Sky

Eagles often steal the spotlight as hunters of the sky, but there are a number of equally impressive birds of prey just as deserving of admiration. From hovering kestrels, nest-building ospreys, and tactical hawks, these 'underlords' prove that bigger isn't always better.

While kestrels are masters of stationary flight, as they scan the fields with ultraviolet vision to spot hidden prey, ospreys are master builders who construct immense and intricate nests made of branches and moss. Zone-tailed hawks, meanwhile, trick prey into thinking them harmless by imitating vultures only interested in cadavers.

Yet, these elegant hunters face threats, mainly from humans. Conservation efforts are helping to protect habitats and encourage breeding, but we must all play a role in ensuring a future for these remarkable creatures.

Wild Rush Hour

Travel through the countryside during the day and you might think the fields and forests are empty, but nature is alive with activity at dawn and dusk. Like humans, animals have a rush hour - where they take advantage of cooler temperatures, avoid humans, and hide from predators.

In the desert, animals forage at dawn before the unbearable heat of the day, while on African plains, herbivores use the twilight rush hour to eat before nocturnal predators emerge. Every day, a huge rush hour that we don't even notice takes place in the oceans, as billions of tiny creatures rise to feed, bringing cold water to the surface. When they return to the deep, they take warm water and carbon with them - unlike our rush hour, which causes global warming with carbon emissions, their rush hour helps fight climate change.

We all know species extinction is a danger, but the delayed effects can reduce the urgency to react. With species disappearing 1,000 times faster than natural extinction rates, biodiversity loss may pose a greater threat to humanity than climate change. Beyond poster animals, such as rhinos and tigers, the world's rarest, and most threatened, creatures need our help.

Bumblebees and hoverflies are essential for pollination. Without them, wildflowers decline, with a knock-on effect on the creatures that feed on these flowers. Parrots crack giant nuts, distributing seeds, and enabling forests to grow. Eliminating one species can have a ripple effect that is felt throughout the natural world. Protecting biodiversity means looking holistically at our environment to understand these connections - and acting now to prevent widespread extinction.

The World's Rarest -**Wildlife Warriors**

Amidst the horrific news of climate change and the biodiversity crisis, some brave individuals are putting their lives on the line to protect wildlife. The anti-poaching patrols of the Save the Rhino Trust often involve local people from low-income communities fighting to save their natural heritage. While facing danger from wild animals and armed rhino poachers, the dedicated teams work closely with local communities to balance their needs with wildlife protection.

In Indonesia, Dr Galdikas, co-founder of the Orangutan Foundation, persuaded the government to establish a wildlife reserve, planted 100,000 trees, and opened an orangutan care centre that has returned over 600 apes into the wild. We can't all open a wildlife sanctuary, but there are many things we can do to protect our planet, and be an everyday wildlife warrior.

The Story of Skin


When we think about organs, we often mean the heart or stomach, but the skin is the largest and most complex organ in our bodies. Across the animal kingdom, skin is incredibly versatile. It grows hair, feathers, or scales, and can provide camouflage, change colour, stretch, or even shed. While human skin is watertight, many animals rely on porous skin to breathe. Amphibians, like bullfrogs, are the master at this, doing 80% of their breathing through their skin, though the permeability leaves them vulnerable to toxins.

Skin is also packed with nerve receptors that send sensations to the brain, warning us of danger, pain, irritation, and temperature changes. Some animals, such as racoons, have super senses due to long hairs or hypersensitive skin. From the largest mammal to the smallest invertebrate, skin is a wonder of nature.

The effects of climate change are already clearly visible in Greenland and Sweden. As glaciers melt and permafrost thaws, animals and humans face dramatic changes. While some animals benefit from these changing conditions, others are increasingly at risk. In Scandinavia Reloaded, we dive into the icy depths of the pack ice with unique footage of rare narwhals with double tusks, and explore why the drop in lemming numbers nearly caused the Arctic fox to vanish.

Despite the threat, conservation efforts and the adaptability of humans and animals is making a difference. Growing seal and cormorant colonies have increased the white-tailed eagle population, and the moose continues to find new food

sources. The resilience of Inuit shows that humans can be part of the solution but time is running out to protect nature's fragile balance.


Though they are not naturally social birds, cranes seek safety in a crowd when they migrate to and from their breeding grounds. On arrival, the cranes act like love-struck teenagers, even though most are long-term couples, as they spread their wings in a graceful courtship dance. Sharing parenting duties, the cranes protect their nest, then feed and train their chicks until it is time to migrate to their winter quarters. Their staging grounds attract birdwatchers and photographers wishing to catch a glimpse of these graceful and iconic birds gathering in small flocks with their young.

This film peeks under the covers to reveal a secret, dreamy world and explores how and why sleep evolved – in humans and in other creatures. Sleep was previously thought to be brain-related, until scientists discovered that prebrain organisms like jellyfish also power down during the night. Predators on high-protein diets sleep more than they are awake, while giraffes hardly sleep at all. Dolphins can send one side of their brain to sleep, and other creatures sleep their way through winter or drought.



The natural world is full of beauty, but we often overlook one of its most spectacular creations – trees. Silent guardians of life, they have existed for millions of years, providing oxygen, food, and shelter for countless creatures. Few animals symbolise our bond with the wild as profoundly as horses. While they shaped human history, their wild ancestors are vanishing. Once abundant, with hundreds of species roaming the globe, only one wild species of horse endures today. Plain zebras in East Africa are master survivors, relying on power, speed, and a powerful kick to evade predators. Donkeys, or asses, also have their roots in the wild, but have been heavily hunted and have lost habitat to humans. From the extinction of the tarpan to the struggles of zebras and asses, the decline of horses reflects a broader loss of biodiversity.



Batty for Bats

Shrouded in mystery and often misunderstood, bats are frequently portrayed as blood-thirsty monsters, but the truth is much more fascinating. Whether they roost in caves or buildings, they are vital to healthy ecosystems - pollinating plants, dispersing seeds, and controlling insects that spread disease.

There are around 1,400 bat species, divided into microbats and megabats. Insect-eating microbats use echolocation to navigate the dark, emitting highpitched clicks and listening for echoes. Megabats, like the flying foxes, have a wingspan of up to two metres, and are found throughout the warmer parts of Africa, Asia, and Australia.

Ignore the myths - far from fearsome, bats are intelligent, social creatures. Whether replanting forests or controlling pests, they're nature's unsung heroes.

The Real Winnie the Pooh: The Story of the **American Black Bear**

Few animals are as iconic as North America's black bears - the real-life inspiration behind Winnie the Pooh. While they may appear funny and cute, these bears are powerful, intelligent, and adaptable predators, capable of thriving almost anywhere across the continent. We follow the lives of four little cubs, born tiny, blind, and helpless, as they grow and learn to fend for themselves.

In late spring, a black bear mother emerges from hibernation, in which she has performed a remarkable feat - giving birth and nursing her cubs without eating, drinking, or even going to the toilet. Now, ten times their 300 g birth weight, the cubs are getting restless and ready to escape their alpine retreat. Expert mountaineers, they learn to use their sharp, curved claws to climb trees and avoid predators, while mama bear keeps a close watch.

A new five-part wildlife and science series explores the latest exciting research on animal communication that decodes the complex languages of animals and discovers that they are just as talkative as humans. Each episode reveals how animals communicate, showcasing the scientists at the heart of this

research, and the technology they are using - from computer simulations to AI programme, and sophisticated recording devices, such as bat detectors.

We reveal how king penguins use a special call to locate their young, and how researchers are trying to decode the different barks of dogs. We also look at the waggle dance that honeybees use to communicate where food sources are

Loving Lagomorphs

You may not know the term 'lagomorphs', but you will recognise their most famous fictional representatives – Peter Rabbit, Bugs Bunny, and Thumper. Lagomorphs include rabbits, hares, and pikas and are some of the world's most resourceful and resilient creatures – from Arctic hares that endure temperatures as low as –50°C due to their rounder bodies and shorter ears, to the jackrabbits of the desert whose massive ears release heat to keep them cool, and the grumpy and solitary pikas who shelter in rocky crevices in the mountains of North America and Asia.

Their position at the base of the food chain makes them vulnerable, but also indispensable to ecosystems, as entire food chains can collapse without them. From the Arctic to the desert, these remarkable creatures prove their endurance and charm in every environment.

Chickens Go Wild

Chickens may be the most common birds on the planet, but beyond the 26 billion that provide eggs and meat, the chicken family thrives on every continent but Antarctica. The Galliformes are feisty, flashy, and fiercely adaptable – from the Satyr Tragopan in Nepal that live in the forest of the Himalayas to the Ptarmigan of Alaska that change their colour with the season.

While females blend into the background to hide from predators while nesting, Galliform males flaunt bold colours, wattles, and combs to attract mates. Some males, such as the peacock, use ornate feathers to impress potential partners, while others, like Gambel's quail of Arizona, mate for life.

Life at the bottom of the food chain can be hard, but the Galliformes are highly intelligent and social creatures, capable of showing empathy and forming alliances.



Indonesia: World of Wonders


